CARRIED**CHAIR'S REPORT**

The following comments were made:

- M. Stockdale thanked the following members for their work on the Youth Summit. N. Hill, B. Dorval, A. Gee and judges, B. Darnell, B. Everdene and Councillor Quiring.
- M. Stockdale received an email from a representative of the Government of Victoria regarding the Carbon Tax impacts and the resulting impacts on the community at large. The feedback received will form the Provincial Government's review on associated programming. CAAC Committee members were invited to share their feedback with M. Stockdale offline by email.
 - The committee noted that one of the realities for the Carbon Tax is that it makes it very easy to switch buying or other life patterns. The other factor is the whole movement toward electric cars; however, the current supply does not match the demand due to production challenges.
 - The Committee discussed that the purchase and use of electric mobility devices are taking off at a consumer level and it is excellent to see how quickly things are moving in that regard.

- It was noted that the townhouse market would be an interesting measurement in terms of heat exchangers, i.e., where adjustments could feasibly be made.
- There were 67,000 trips on the e-scooter trips in the City of Vernon last year. The very first year there was not much marketing with the program and yet it was well received by the public.

- **Community Engagement**

The team met on June 20. The team reviewed the workshops summary and the communications report. This workshop summary integrated all the CE feedback from the workshops held over the past year: two last spring with CAAC members, and two over the winter (Nov and March) with the Climate Ambassadors and other stakeholders (staff, etc).

Considering formalizing the Ambassador Program and with a "call-out" to the community at large". Branding, logos, messaging, and kits will be developed the Ambassadors and others.

Staff noted that edits from the Community Engagement Team will be incorporated into the community engagement strategy and it will be presented at the Committee at an upcoming meeting.

- **Youth Engagement**

The Climate Youth Summit was held, 31 student groups made presentations. The students learned a lot and they were engaged in a call to action on Climate Issues.

J. Comazzetto noted that the Superintendent was excited by the event. The overall feedback received was that it was excellently done and the hope is that the program can be continued for next year.

The committee would like Administration to explore budget and funding sources and report back to the next meeting with a recommendation to council.

The Climate Action Advisory Committee tabled two (2) motions as a show of support for School District No. 22 and the May 31, 2022, Youth Climate Action Summit as follows:

- **Fundraising**

Met on June 21, 2022. Set up an online tracking tool.

There is a program right now for homeowners to obtain funding. suggested that a role for the City would be to assist citizens with enrollment in the program. **J. Fyke and M. Stockdale** are committed to monitoring opportunities monthly.

The step code has been brought in, and building retrofits is the next piece. M. Stockdale noted that the Master's Student could feasibly be a resource for the project, the student will start in September 2022.

Staff noted that Vernon's portion of the newly funded Government program will likely be \$205,000, staff noted the monies are going to be applied to the Climate Action Revolving Fund; however, staff are still reviewing the program and will have a further update in September.

- **Organics Promotion**

- **Metrics and Reporting**

At the May 25, 2022, CAAC, the Committee discussed how to actively support organics program through their networks including the Climate Action Ambassadors. CAAC received written correspondence from the Josh Winqvist, Communications Officer, City of Vernon with key talking points regarding the City of Vernon's organics program.

CAAC members were asked to think of how they might personalize the messaging and send to their various networks.

NEW BUSINESS:

- **Agents of Change (Canadian ICLEI Membership)**
 - The City was successful in securing \$15,000 from Agents of Change, a network made up of Canadian municipalities to deliver a range of programs and activities. It was discussed that Agents of Change is a peer network where learnings from other communities can be shared.
 - Staff noted that when ICLEI Workshops become available members of the CAAC will be invited to participate.
- **Summer Meeting Schedule**
 - There will be no meeting in July, the next meeting will be **August 24, 2022**

In May of this year, a small collaborative of teachers hosted our first Climate Summit. Barry Dorval and Yvonne Fiala from Seaton, Leon Kopy from VSS, Dave Fehr from Kal, and myself from Fulton. Our student group was approximately 150 grade 11 students who worked in teams to research and present a project of their choice that met specific criteria. Projects had to fit within the UNSDG's, Vernon's CAP Areas of Focus, and be action oriented. The event was held at the Rec center Auditorium, was open to the public, and included key note speakers and workshops for the students. As well, we enlisted the help of Ms. Joe DeVries of The Fresh Outlook Foundation as an event coordinator. The Summit was a great success and we produced a short video, with the help of Sproing Creative, that we would love to share with council to give a clear summary of the event.

Over the next decade, as Vernon undertakes the transition to net zero, our ability to engage the community in this pursuit is paramount and the role of our schools to build knowledge, skills and attitudes in our youth will be a crucial piece.

We would like to host another Summit in November 2022 to build on the successes of our first event, and am asking the city of Vernon for financial help to bring this event to reality. Dr. Christine Perkins, our superintendent of schools, supported the May event with financial help. We will need an additional \$25,000 to cover expenses this fall.
